| Barriers to learning these priorities address | Historically too few pupils (eligible for Pupil Premium funding) have achieved ARE. Attendance and punctuality of pupils eligible for Pupil Premium funding are not as good as for 'all' pupils. Many children who are eligible for Pupil Premium funding have not had the exposure to a broad range of experiences and knowledge that others bring to their work. Some families have additional challenges within their homes and family life, which can affect pupils' ability to access learning. |

| To provide families with the support they need to enable pupils to arrive at school, on time and ready for their learning. | Through half termly inclusion meetings, a range of appropriate support was put in place and reviewed for all pupils eligible for PP funding. 19 families received input from a menu of activities/support that was academy and/or external service led. As a result of targeted support/intervention, there is a reduction in the number of families requiring higher tier support. A thrive assessment and follow up interventions were undertaken with all pupils eligible for PP funding. The following impact can be evidenced: - 11 children made progress through the thrive bands of at least one tier. 2 children made significant progress. |
| To raise attainment of pupils eligible for PP funding through the | Tracking data shows that attainment of PP pupils in all year groups has improved when compared to previous year- these remains a focus for teachers. |

| use of targeted intervention. | Curriculum reviews undertaken in 2023 showed that pupils eligible for PP funding were, overall, able to articulate their learning in all subjects. The data shows that intervention strategies used have been successful. These will continue in 23/24 Ofsted report 2022 stated that pupil cater for individual children's needs. |

| To ensure pupils eligible for pupil premium funding have access to a range of experiences. | All pupils eligible for PP funding accessed their personal budget. No pupil was disadvantaged/missed out (trips/clubs) due to financial constraints. 49 (out of a possible 55) pupils eligible for PP accessed after school clubs. Teachers, parents and pupils have reported that pupils have grown in confidence and have been able to access activities/experiences that parents/carers could not have otherwise afforded. Moving forward, a free club will be offered every half term to all pupil premium children. |
