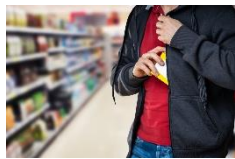


Overview		
In this sequence of learning, pupils learn how to show respect by thinking about the way they speak to others and how their actions affect people around them. They explore how anti-social behaviour harms victims and understand the consequences it can have in the community and in the future. Pupils learn that following the law shows respect, as breaking laws creates a ripple effect that impacts many people. They also learn factual information about legal drugs and marriage law to challenge misconceptions. Finally, pupils explore the risks of carrying a weapon, understanding both the legal consequences and the dangers to their physical safety.		
What should I already know?	Vocabulary	
- We belong to different communities that have rules to keep us safe. - Understanding risks helps us make good choices, especially online. - Children must follow online rules and cannot gamble because it is unsafe. - Respect, empathy, and knowing how to stay safe help us protect ourselves and others in everyday life.	Theft  Impact of theft	Taking something that does not belong to you without paying or asking. How stealing affects others, such as making people feel upset, unsafe, or losing money.
What will I know by the end of the sequence?		
- Stealing from a shop means taking something without paying. Shop theft can hurt businesses and make prices go up. Friends can sometimes pressure us, but we can still make our own choices. - Anti-social behaviour is when someone acts in a way that upsets or harms others. This behaviour can make people feel scared, sad, or unsafe. Understanding how others feel helps us make kinder choices. - Legal drugs include things like medicines or products adults are allowed to buy. Even legal drugs can be dangerous if used wrongly. - The law explains who is allowed to get married. Some people choose arranged marriages, but forced marriage is never allowed. - A weapon is something that can hurt someone. Most people, especially children, are not allowed to carry weapons. Some young people carry weapons because they feel scared, but it is unsafe and against the law. 	Empathy	Understanding how someone else feels and caring about their feelings.
	Decision making	Thinking carefully before choosing what to do, especially when the choice could affect you or others.
